Message from the Pastor

Hello Church!

It's summer time, and lately it feels like so much is going back to "normal." This is both exciting and exhausting. It's exciting to get back to the things that bring us joy, but it is exhausting when the busy schedules resume. And this makes me think: what did we learn from this past year that we can take with us as we return to normalcy?

Here's what I've learned:

- Not everything needs to be in-person. Especially in the winter when most of us don't want to run out in the dark for another meeting (church, school, clubs). While in-person meetings are beneficial, sometimes being able to "Zoom" from home is a blessing.
- Family time is important. When we overschedule and overcommit, we lose time with our loved ones. Prioritizing our family over activities is something we will hopefully continue to do after this pandemic is over.
- Mental Health is essential and needs to be destigmatized. There has been a lot of progress in this field, but we still have a ways to go. In one of my latest Mental Health first aid trainings, we learned that while mental illness is something that affects people in different ways (depression, anxiety, etc.), Mental HEALTH is something we all need to maintain. Just like we maintain our body's physical health, we also need to practice maintaining our mental health. For me, the best ways to maintain my mental health are prayer, exercise, and meditation.
- The words we say online matter. We all spent a lot of time online this year, and hopefully we've all learned that those jabs that we say to people online hurt just as must as the things we say to one another in-person. Sometimes words we say online can even hurt in unintentional ways when we're not careful.
- And last but definitely not least: God is everywhere. This year we learned that we could "go to church" and worship God from home, and the reason is because God is everywhere. We can find God in nature, we can experience God when we worship online or in-person. We can be the hands and feet of God when we're helping someone physically or from a distance. God is everywhere, and everywhere we go, we take God with us.

Have you sat down and reflected on what you've learned from this past year? What will you take with you as normalcy resumes? What will you leave in the past, realizing that it caused you more harm than good? Hopefully you, like me, have realized that nothing is more important than faith and family. To steal a line from one of my favorite sermon stories, "everything else is just commentary."

Hi everyone. My name is John Pauling. I've been a member of Zion UCC since 2015 and I'm honored to currently serve on the Board of Trustees. I help to coordinate fundraising activities for our church which include our basket raffles, meat raffles, and our upcoming BBQ Chicken Fundraiser. As you know, fundraising is a team event. At church, you may have heard of "the 3 J's". That is myself, Joyce Dolce, and Jeff Quinton (my husband). The three of us lead many of our fundraising activities. But, of course, it takes the efforts and support of the entire congregation and community to make any event a success. My interest in fundraising began about 14 years ago when I started as a volunteer at the SPCA Serving Erie County. Shortly after becoming volunteers, Jeff and I co-facilitated a volunteer-run, annual rummage sale event (called Rummage 4 Rover - or R4R). The event ran for 4 consecutive years and in that time we raised almost \$30,000 for the shelter. In fact, R4R is what brought Jeff and I to the church! After our 2nd year running R4R, we quickly realized that we needed a larger venue. It was then that our dear friend, Marilyn Stewart, introduced us to Zion and we ended up renting Kuck Hall. We quickly realized what a loving community Zion had to offer and the rest was history. Jeff and I live in Tonawanda with our 4-year old dog, Buster (who, of course, was adopted from the SPCA). We enjoy our time working around the house on our 1/2 acre lot and enjoying the outdoors as much as possible!



James Cousins

James Cousins has been a member of Zion's Board of Trustees since 2012, and an active member of the congregation since 2010. James and his family originally came to Zion after buying their very first home only one block from the church. A flyer delivered by a congregant was the hook!

In 2018, after working with church leadership to revise the Constitution and ByLaws, James became Chair of the Board of Trustees. Assisted by the superb members of the Board, James has overseen the largest growth in Zion's endowment in our recorded history, and has seen the Board take a more active role in the care and maintenance of the Church's infrastructure.

James is an attorney and partner at an Amherst-based litigation firm where he supervises fifteen attorneys in addition to carrying his own caseload. His wife, Sarah, is a professor of history at the University at Buffalo. Together they have four daughters: Ainsley, Emma, Zoey and Lucy.

James is a graduate of the University at Buffalo School of Law and Dickinson College. A native of southwest Pennsylvania, James was an Eagle Scout and All-State swimmer for Peters Township High School. James is an avid chess player, hunter, and golfer when he can find any free time. James is also an officer in the New York Guard State Defense Force where he currently holds the rank of Captain and presently serves an Area Command (Brigade) staff officer. In this capacity, James has deployed on active duty several times, most recently to assist New York's military response to the COVID-19 Pandemic and has played a role in responding to no fewer than eleven natural disasters which prompted a military response in the last four years.

Compassion, Presence, & Care: Basic Training for Lay Pastoral Care Saturday, July 17

This workshop provides a theological foundation for pastoral caring activities and it is designed to help volunteers improve their competence and confidence. Through presentations, discussions, and small group practice exercises you will learn the opportunities and limitations of lay ministry.

You will also learn to make use of the tools of empathetic engagement, boundary-setting, healthy communication, and a useful approach to assessment and referral.

This workshop is open to all who serve (or expect to serve) religious institutions as deacons, elders, Stephen Ministers, volunteer visitors, etc. or who are otherwise interested in the subject. This is basic training, but those who wish to refresh their skills will also find it valuable.

Spirituality for YOU and ME!

Everyone seems to be talking about spirituality these days, but do we know what we mean by the word? For example, when people say, "I'm spiritual, not religious," what does that mean? Or when people look to religious traditions for guidance in developing a spiritual life, what are they actually looking for?
